

Erasmus + Programme Erasmus Mundus Design Measures (EMDM)

What is Erasmus+?

Erasmus+ is the EU-funded programme to support individual exchanges and institutional cooperation in the fields of education, training, youth and sport. The programme has a strong international dimension, which opens up many of these opportunities to individuals and stakeholders from countries worldwide. All projects are based on partnerships: the international dimension usually requires a partnership between institutions from 33 countries (EU Member States plus six countries associated to the programme) on the one hand, and those from non-associated third countries on the other.

What is Erasmus Mundus?

The Erasmus Mundus action comprises **Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters (EMJM)** and **Erasmus Mundus Design Measures (EMDM)**. They are autonomous funding schemes with independent calls for proposals. EMJMs support tjoint master programmes during its implementation whereas EMDMs support the design of future joint master programmes.

What is an EMDM project?

Erasmus Mundus Design Measures are projects which support the **design of high-level study programmes at master level**, jointly delivered by an international consortium of higher education institutions (HEIs) from different countries and, where relevant, other educational and/or non-educational partners with specific expertise and interest in the concerned study areas/professional domains.

What does an EMDM project do?

The main objective of the Erasmus Mundus Design Measures is to encourage **the development of innovative, highly integrated, new international study programmes at Master level.** The project must include activities that involve higher education institutions from one or more countries not associated to the Erasmus+ programme, while also involving (a) countries and/or (b) institutions **that are under-represented in Erasmus Mundus.**

By joining the action, beneficiaries will commit to initiate contact and collaboration activities in view of setting up a master programme in line with the definition set for Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters:

- Offer a fully integrated curriculum delivered by a partnership of HEIs
- Aim at recruiting excellent students worldwide
- Include compulsory physical mobility for all recruited students
- Lead to either a joint degree or multiple degrees.

<u>Expected outcome of an EMDM:</u> the project is expected to have designed the following joint mechanisms for the master programme under development:

- Joint programme design and joint procedures
- Joint **administrative** and financial management
- Common **services** offered to students

- Joint promotion and dissemination
- A draft joint Partnership and Student Agreement
- A joint degree policy and launch of accreditation process
 - + explore opportunities offered by the **European Approach for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmes** (if national legislation allows).

Structure of an EMDM project

- Mono-beneficiary grant agreement: one beneficiary mobilising a group of other HEIs (aiming at setting up a consortium)
- **Duration** of an EMDM project: **15 months**
- **EU grant** for an EMDM project: a **lump sum contribution of 60 000 Euros** for costs directly linked to the activities necessary to set up the new master programme and other expenditure in so far as relevant for the implementation of the action.

Who can apply and take part in EMDM? How?

> Any eligible HEI from an EU Member State or third country associated to the Erasmus+ Programme can submit an application.
